

GFMC Tool 2 – Regional Wildland Fire Networks under the aegis of the Global Wildland Fire Network

Brief description of the tool: In many countries the awareness of the magnitude of the role of landscape fires (e.g., fire occurrence / impacts, fire management options, importance of the role of civil society in the management of fire, sound / benign fire application; avoidance of unnecessary or detrimental burning practices; prevention of wildfires; self-defence / local management including suppression at local level) is only marginally developed, or not at all. The lack of human, technical and financial resources in many countries calls for sharing expertise across borders especially where similar eco-zones, climate or socio-cultural conditions exist. Regional networking, involving cross-boundary dialogue, informal cooperation, voluntary non-binding agreements and legally binding bilateral agreements, create synergies, trust, confidence and effectiveness and efficiency of sharing expertise. The international wildland fire community is organized in 14 independent Regional Wildland Fire Networks, most of which closely cooperate under the umbrella of the Global Wildland Fire Network (GWFN).

Target groups: National agencies, NGOs, secretariats of regional / multilateral agreements (e.g., ASEAN, SADC)
